





10 reasons + 10 years = Decade of Action

Ten reasons to act on road deaths:

- 1. 1.3 million people are killed on the world's roads each year:
- 2. Road crashes kill more people than Malaria
- 3. 50 million people are injured, many disabled as a result.
- 4. 90% of these casualties occur in developing countries
- 5. Annual deaths are forecast to rise to 1.9 million by 2020
- 6. It is the No.1 cause of death for young people worldwide
- By 2015 it will be the leading health burden for children over the age of five in developing countries
- 8. The economic cost to developing countries is at least \$100 billion a year
- Injuries place immense burdens on hospitals and health systems
- 10. Road crashes are preventable

Every Day in Scotland there are 41 reported casualties, of which 7 are either killed or seriously injured (2009)

- Up to 1/3rd road accidents involve someone who is driving in the course of their work. (as high as 60% in UK)
- Aprox 70 fatalities, 5000 casualties


