

Carbon Monoxide

The 'Be Aware' project was recently implemented in areas of north Glasgow. Thanks to funding from The Gas Distribution Networks' Carbon Monoxide Collaboration Fund and The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, this project focussed on increasing awareness of the issue of carbon monoxide poisoning in the local area. RoSPA teamed up with NG homes to run this pilot project in anticipation of winter in order to ensure this life saving advice is available.

Tenants in Possilpark, Springburn, Parkhouse and Balornock received a 'Be Aware' resource, which aimed to raise awareness of the issue of carbon monoxide poisoning and bring them to the RoSPA website for further information. 'Safe as Houses?' Seminars



Falls Prevention: Cost-Effective Commissioning

A recent publication by Public Health England (PHE) shows that falls prevention programmes, based on home assessment and modification schemes for older people, have reduced the number of falls requiring hospital admission over two years by an estimated 29 per cent, produced a financial return on investment of £3.17 for every £1 spent, and a societal (quality of life) return of £7.34 for every £1 spent.
